Kit cost --- \$10.00

Exploring Cork Fabric: --- Our program for the evening will be creating your own Scissor/Blade cover with cork fabric. You will add an element of sparkle to your cork fabric by embellishing with a blanket stitch beaded edge. You have the option of also making a **heart shaped fob** for your scissors with a beaded edge, as time allows. (The scissor fobs and covers will be machine stitched together for ease of embellishing)

<u>Included in your program kit:</u> --- will be the supplies for <u>a small and medium scissor blade</u> <u>protector</u> and heart fobs along with a few larger beads for sparkle. Your Cork Fabric kit will also include a threaded beading needle, beading thread, an assortment of color coordinated beads, size I I Delica beads and a lobster clasp and instructions.



Color choices will be Red Delica beads or Blue Delica beads or Gold Delica beads — I will bring an assortment of color choice kits. Or if you have a specific color you would prefer, please contact me so that I can put your name on your color choice.
